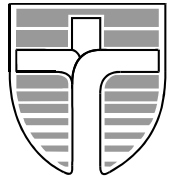

## FRENCH EXCHANGE

This year 16 senior French students (Years 11-13) took part in an exchange to France in March. We spent three days in Paris, cycling around Versailles (in the rain) and seeing some of the wonderful sights of Paris. Then we took a fast train down to the West coast to Les Sables d'Olonnes, a small tourist town, about an hour from Nantes. It has a beautiful beach and a real café culture. There the students met their homestay families and spent the next week with them. The students were, of course, very nervous but all went well. The families took them out at the weekends and the school organized trips during the day to Nantes, a brioche factory, a chocolate museum, a vineyard and to see a Molière play with the rest of the French Year 11 students. Eight days after arriving, it was time to say goodbye to the families and head for the sun on the South coast. The students who had been so nervous at the beginning said goodbye very sadly as they had had such a good time. We finished our trip by visiting Avignon (the Pope's Palace and Old Bridge), Arles (Van Gogh country), a perfume factory in Grasse and we finished with two nights in Nice.

The students were amazing to travel with and the improvement in their listening and speaking skills after just eight nights with their families was impressive. My sincere thanks to Mr Peter Sinclair and the accompanying parents for their help with this trip.

Then it was our turn to welcome the French students from Sainte Marie du Port. They have just spent ten nights with our students in Rotorua, exploring the city and its environs. We were lucky enough to have a Mayor's reception at the Council Buildings where our Mayor Steve Chadwick welcomed the French group warmly to Rotorua. They also visited the Museum, had some luge rides at Skyline Skyrides with a beautiful view over the city, spent a most interesting morning at Redstag Timber and had a full day visiting Craters of the Moon and Taupo. We finished with a swim at the Blue Baths. In addition, the host families did a wonderful job taking the French students around. Although it was winter, the group seemed to enjoy themselves and the accompanying teachers were delighted with the reception that the group received.

I would like to thank all the families who hosted students but particularly those who hosted students even though their son/daughter did not go on the trip this year. A special mention must go to Yvonne Piebenga who hosted a student with a bad leg injury; Philippa Williams for organizing the Mayor's reception; Phil Lindsay for the visit to Redstag; Debbie Cossar for organizing the speaker from "Tourism Rotorua" and Ruth O'Leary who took a day off work to drive her French student to Waikato Hospital after a mountain biking accident.

## KIA ORA TATOU FROM THE COUNSELLORS

In our role as counsellors we are sometimes asked for suggestions in bringing up teenagers, particularly when boundaries and rules are challenged as young people grow towards greater independence. With this in mind we thought it might interest you to read some of the research into parenting styles.

An approach to parenting which is linked with the most successful child outcomes is an authoritative parenting style. The following website is well worth a browse for more in depth research into this approach and its outcomes. <http://www.parentingscience.com/authoritative-parenting-style.html> Briefly though, here is a summary of this approach.

The authoritative parenting style is about setting limits, reasoning with kids, and being responsive to their emotional needs.

**Setting limits:** Authoritative parents take a firm stand, expecting their kids to behave responsibly. An example of this might be an agreed time for a teen to return home from being out with friends,

**Reasoning with children:** When kids make mistakes or misbehave, parents attempt to reason with their children. They emphasize the reasons for rules. Authoritative parents encourage a verbal give-and-take, and explain the consequences of good and bad behaviour.

In the example above, the reasons for the set time for return home are fully discussed (eg. safety, need for family or homework commitments). Consequences of not meeting the curfew are also discussed before the teen goes out and are stuck to if they return late.

**Being responsive to their emotional needs:** Authoritative parents show high levels of warmth and connection. As children reach their teens it can be a challenge for parents to find ways to connect with them. Sometimes, previously chatty kids can become withdrawn and non-communicative. A lovely resource for creating opportunities for talk in a fun and non-confronting way can be found at <http://momastery.com/blog/2015/04/24/key-jar/> The Key Jar, as the name suggests, offers keys, by way of conversation starters, to open doors for talk around a whole range of topics, some light-hearted, some more serious, and all providing opportunity for connection with our kids. Great for meal times! (Thanks to Natasha Sarich-Dunn for sharing this resource.)

Kids raised by authoritative parents are more likely to become independent, self-reliant, socially accepted, academically successful, and well-behaved. They are less likely to report depression and anxiety, and less likely to engage in antisocial behaviour like delinquency and drug use. Some food for thought perhaps, as we grow our gorgeous children into good young men and women.

## WHY Umpire? Why Referee? Why bother?

Most thankless task you could ever volunteer for. It's the toughest ask in sport. Umpires and referees are the cornerstone of sport, without them there'd be chaos.

There are persons unknown on the side line that are experts; they see things that you don't, mainly because they were in the right position to see it. Then it's the follow up verbal abuse.

(Because you were behind a line of players and you missed that slight forward pass, and the other team scores.)

The persons unknown always reckon they could do a better job of it, but find excuses not to take up the whistle.

As an umpire or referee, there is nowhere to hide, if you make an error it's magnified. You just take it on board and move on, there is no replay, no assistant referee.

I've been a referee and have had my share of sideline verbal abuse.

Worst case I had was a *referee who coaches*; I had to RED card him. He was coaching a year 7 & 8 team and was being very technical on every call (He referees at National games) at year 7 & 8 level they just want to play and have fun doing it; they are not at that skill set or that level. Also at this level you are at the mercy of a running clock, so you need to let the game flow.

### Couple of examples I have received over the years:

Coach: Ref you need glasses (I wear glasses). He had been harassing me most of the game.  
My response: Hope you are not colour blind, this is a RED Card, 1 match suspension.

Aussie Coach: You need an Aussie Rule book mate.

My response: I showed him the Aussie rule book I had. Same rules in NZ mate, just different covers.

Coach: Is there something wrong with your other arm ref.

My response: I'll use it once you stop trying to referee my game. (He got the message.)

Coaches have a big role to play when it comes to supporting attitudes towards umpires or referees, they know that it's a tough job making the calls on the field and trying to get them right.

I've come to appreciate that sometimes the referee doesn't have the same line of sight, as some spectators or coaches.

A lot of people stop umpiring after incidents of physical or verbal abuse. Players and parents witness this and decide **NO**, don't ask me to take up the whistle and umpire or referee.

You actually do have fun umpiring or referring.

Especially if you have your own one liners.

I was refereeing at a tournament recently and a coach was handing out treats, one of the players came over and gave me her treat and said thank you ref.
