KIA ORA TATOU FROM THE COUNSELLORS						
While much of what we do in counselling is in response to problems brought to us, we aim also to be proactive in helping students to develop both the skills for dealing with challenges and the resilience to side step bumps in the road as they journey onward in life.						
Resilience - What exactly is it and why is it so important? Here are 2 definitions:						
Resilience can be understood as the capacity to spring back, rebound and successfully adapt in the face of adversity (Henderson et al, 1999).						
In a New Zealand context, resiliency could be considered as hauora – a state of strength and well-being. It gives individuals living in an adverse environment the capacity to surmount their difficulties (Peters and Thurlow, 2002)						
Considering the daily challenges that lie ahead for our young people, helping them to develop resilience will be very important in supporting them to enjoy fulfilling lives of emotional and social well-being.						
One thing that students tell us is helpful in building resiliency is summed up well in the following words:						
Sometimes I can change things and sometimes I can't BUT I can change the way I think about things.						
When students visit us with a problem they often describe feelings of worry, upset, fear or anger. What they don't always notice is that these feelings sit alongside unhelpful thoughts.						
Negative self-talk such as " <i>I can never keep any friends</i> " often leads to unhelpful conclusions about ourselves, feelings of upset, and behaviours that can end up worsening the problem.						
If we can challenge the negative thoughts, the feelings that accompany this thinking also become more positive, our behaviours change and these then feed into further positive thoughts. Eg. Instead of " <i>I can never keep any friends</i> " we might think " <i>I have some good friends</i> ". Our feelings might change from loneliness and upset to appreciation and confidence and we might find ourselves accepting rather than avoiding invitations to connect with others.						
Resilience is all about having self-belief in our ability to stay in charge of our reactions to challenges.

# Title: DebtArtist: Cindy HuangMedia:Oil on hardboardContext:Oil on hardboard

We all live imprisoned in a capitalistic society, where we are chained to a job. Since kindergarten we are destined to be a part of it. I often ponder on the purpose of education. We are coerced into believing that without it, we will not get a good job. Further to that the purpose of a career inevitably is to make money.

Money inadvertently is like mothers milk to an infant, without it we don't believe we are capable of surviving.

This painting is very much symbolic of our relationship with our society we live in today, enslaved to capitalism, disciples of money.

While some of the symbolism I use may appear obvious, there are also painting devices I've used that draw attention to key concepts working throughout the work



The *slave collar and tie* are of the same color pallet. We readily associate the color green with money, which substantiates how and why the tie and shackled collar are connected. The entire painting's color scheme is designed to emulate New Zealand currency.

The *chains* attaching the collar to the birds are translucent and less detailed. This alludes to the fact these chains are imagined by us, they are not real or tangible, and we are not truly bound by them.

Humming birds are well known for their high metabolism. They consume a large amount of food, 1.5-3 times their body weight everyday just to survive. The Humming birds are a metaphor for how we, like them, are driven by an insatiable urge to survive. Unfortunately we believe we have no choice but to earn money, to ensure our survival.

The *suit* is too big on the character which is not a misunderstanding about proportion. It is a deliberate pictorial device which symbolizes naivety. Suits often symbolize success, and aspiring to be a high earning executive is not necessarily a "good fit" for everyone.

The distortion of the face is to show that the character sees a distorted version of the world. It is also an intentional ploy to engage the viewer and entice them to question the context

The young aspiring gentleman is portrayed *with three pairs of eyes*. He is of the opinion that he thinks he is more aware of the world, to the point where he has convinced himself he is on a path to success. As the painter I want to challenge the viewer's notions of success.

The *right eye has a cataract.* It is noticeably different when viewed closely. This symbolizes that he thinks he thinks he's right, but he's actually blinded to the truth. It also suggests that we need to spend time closely observing and getting to know people, what drives them, perhaps even with some empathy or a different viewpoint

**Congratulations to Cindy Huang** who was selected to exhibit her painting "Debt" in the Rotorua Museum Art Awards for 2015. This is a highly competitive Award. Over one hundred artists from the Bay of Plenty entered and could submit up to two works to be judged. Only 27 artists made it into the exhibition with Cindy being the youngest, and drawing a great number of admiring comments.

Her piece cleverly uses a variety of symbolic images to engage the viewer in a visual discussion about how we are driven by the desire to work hard in order to earn money. Cindy is proposing that perhaps there needs to be more of a balance in our lives, and that we may lose sight of what's really important if we live to work and are driven by money.
