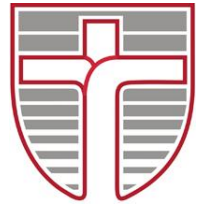

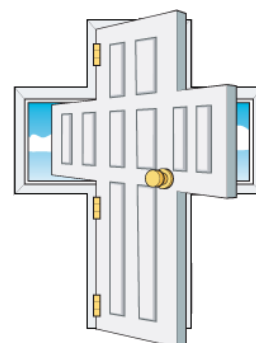
2017 ENROLMENTS

Fees for domestic (non-international) students:

NCEA entry	\$76.70 per candidate
Each NZ Scholarship subject	\$30.00 per subject

Fees for International Fee Paying Students:

NCEA entry	\$383.30 per candidate
Each NZ Scholarship subject	\$102.20 per subject

- have joint family income that qualifies for Community Services card
- have two or more children entered as candidates with fees more than \$200.

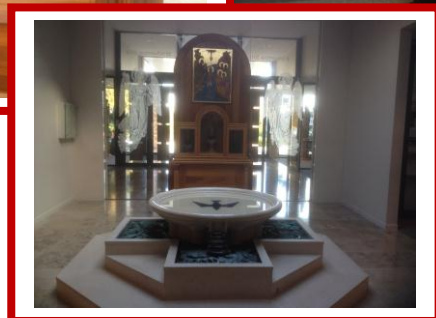

BUSINESS STUDIES TRIP TO CHINA

Just prior to the April school holidays, 20 senior Business Studies and Economics students and parents set off to visit The People's Republic of China.

We landed in Beijing to a world vastly different to NZ - exotic buildings, many many people, interesting smells, delicious food and a level of military and police security that we're not used to. Our first day dawned a beautiful blue sky day - unusual in China but perfect conditions for our trip to the Great Wall of China.

The section of the Wall we visited was not too touristy, so we were able to walk freely and take a lot of photos without crowds of people. Some of our group spent an energetic 1.5 hours on the Wall and went as far and high as they could while others had a more



leisurely approach and just wandered along enjoying the place. Back in Beijing, we visited a traditional Tea House for a tea ceremony before heading to the Wangfujing Night Markets for dinner. This group of students were very adventurous and were happy to try eating scorpion, snake and cricket freshly cooked in front of them. In Beijing, we also visited Tiananmen Square, the Forbidden City, went to a Peking Duck restaurant for dinner and took a rickshaw ride through the narrow streets of old Chinese hutongs before having lunch in the home of a local family. No trip to China would be complete without visiting some of the local fake markets where the students (and adults) shopped for every

imaginable fake brand we could think of. Gucci handbags, Converse sneakers, Prada purses, Versace cufflinks, Beats headphones, Omega and Armani watches ... the students learned the tricks of haggling and wrangling a bargain very quickly!



From Beijing we caught a high speed train and travelled the 1200km to Shanghai in just five hours. The smog throughout this journey was disturbing – at times it was so dense that it was difficult to make out towering apartment blocks less than 1km from the train tracks.



Shanghai is a bright, modern high-rise city in comparison to the low-rise grey Beijing. Our first day started with joining the elderly locals in People's Park for Tai Chi at 7am. Over the next few days we visited the famous Chinese garden YuYuan Gardens and the adjoining Chinatown market, the Tailors Market where some people had winter coats and suits made to measure, an acrobatic show, went for a river cruise at night to see the beautiful brightly lit skyscrapers, the Coca Cola factory and a 101st floor observation deck.

During this time we were also hosted by the NZ Consulate in Shanghai and met a series of business people who related their work to the business theory the students had learned in class.

Our last destination was to visit the largest commodity market in the world – the size of this market is so enormous, it is difficult to describe. The building is 800 times larger than Bunnings, has approximately 70 000 stores (each about the size of an average kitchen) and more than 1.3 million different products. Everything that is made in China can be bought at this market. There were shops which only sold dice, another that only sold split rings, another selling only superglue, walking sticks, fake plants, globes, fake eyelashes, wet wipes, electrical wire, post it notes, gardening gloves, dog leashes ... we wandered around this market for two days in astonishment at the size and scale and the obscure things that were sold there.



The students on this trip were integral to making it a successful and happy trip overseas. Their enthusiasm, willingness to try new things and curiosity was delightful and made for an overall memorable experience.
